**CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Meister called the meeting to order at 6:12 p.m.

**PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:** Matt Gill led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**ROLL CALL:**

**PRESENT:** Councilmember D’Amico, Councilmember Erickson, Councilmember Horvath, Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne, and Mayor Meister.

**ABSENT:** None.

**ALSO PRESENT:** City Manager Wilson, City Attorney Langer, City Clerk Crowder, and Assistant City Clerk Poblador.

**REPORT OF CLOSED SESSION AGENDA:**

City Attorney Langer reported that the Closed Session was called to order at 5:30 p.m. She stated that there was no public comment. The City Council discussed the two items on the posted agenda and took no reportable action. The Closed Session adjourned at 6:10 p.m.

**APPROVAL OF AGENDA:**

City Clerk Crowder indicated that Item 2.U. will be Tabled. She also noted that Dr. Torbati, Medical Director of Cedars Sinai Emergency Department, will provide information related to Item 4.A. during the City Manager’s Report.

Councilmember Horvath requested that Items 5.B. and 5.D. be moved to the Consent Calendar as Items 2.X. and 2.Z., respectively.

Councilmember Erickson requested that Item 5.C. be moved to the Consent Calendar as Item 2.Y.

**Motion by Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne, seconded by Councilmember Erickson, to approve the January 18, 2022 Agenda as amended, and approved.**

**ADJOURNMENT MOTIONS:**

Councilmember Horvath requested that the meeting be adjourned in memory of Los Angeles County Firefighter Jonathan Flagler, Clyde Bellecourt, Sidney Poitier, and Senator Harry Reid.

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Councilmember Erickson requested that the meeting be adjourned in memory of Leslie Barbara Monroy, Betty White, and Eduardo Federico Vargas Ojeda.

Mayor Meister requested that the meeting be adjourned in memory of Patsy Lou Schumacher.

**PRESENTATIONS:**

Councilmember Horvath presented a Proclamation to the Friends of the West Hollywood Library Bookstore.

**1. PUBLIC COMMENT:**

MATT GILL, WEST HOLLYWOOD LIBRARY, congratulated the Friends of the Library on their Proclamation and highlighted some of the West Hollywood Library's programming that was made possible by the work of the Friends of the Library.

JACKIE STEELE, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of Items 5.B., 5.C., and 5.D.

ROBERT OLIVER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of Items 5.B., 5.C., and 5.D.

NICOLE KRISTAL, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of Items 5.B., 5.C., and 5.D.

JORDAN DAVID, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in opposition to Item 2.F. and suggested a community-led response to noise instead.

KHANSA JONES-MUHAMMAD, WEST HOLLYWOOD, requested that the City Table Item 2.T. to allow for consultation with other state and local groups that are already doing this work.

DAN MORIN, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about the crime in the City and asked that the City address the issue.

ADAM DARVISH, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in favor of funding for Smart Cities and about public safety.

KERRI BALBONE, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of Items 5.B., 5.C., and 5.D. and highlighted concerns regarding Items 4.A. and 5.A.

MJ GODGES, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of Item 5.B.

**COUNCILMEMBER COMMENTS AND MEETING ATTENDANCE REPORTS:**

Councilmember D'Amico stated that he has no comments this evening.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne thanked everyone who spoke under Public Comment this evening. She wished everyone a Happy New Year. She thanked staff for the ADA

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(Americans with Disabilities Act) parking spots on the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor of the West Hollywood Library parking garage. She acknowledged City staff and Ascencia for Item 2.S. She expressed gratitude to Councilmembers Horvath and Erickson for bringing forth the Item 2.V. She thanked her colleagues for supporting Queer Women's Visibility Week. She noted that she was impressed with Item 2.T. and suggested that staff work with the groups noted during Public Comment. She mentioned Item 2.N. which approves an agreement with a consultant to develop an RFP for City-wide public/private broadband network. She requested an update regarding the accident that occurred on Santa Monica Boulevard and San Vicente Boulevard and recommended that the City's traffic engineer review the intersection.

Councilmember Erickson reported his attendance at 3<sup>rd</sup> District Oversight Board, the January 13<sup>th</sup> Lesbian and Gay Advisory Board meeting, the January 10<sup>th</sup> Public Safety Commission meeting, the January 6<sup>th</sup> Joint Women's Safety Subcommittee meeting, the Chamber of Commerce's All Business meeting, and the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health weekly COVID-19 call. He requested that staff address fraudulent COVID-19 testing sites reportedly being seen in the City. He mentioned the opening of Emerald Village Annual Meeting and the Proclamation that Mayor Meister presented to Jake Stevens. He further reported his attendance at the California Cities Policy Committee meeting as well as Plummer Park Subcommittee meeting. He thanked the sponsors of #Boom! and recognized their hard work putting this annual event together. As part of his Councilmember comments, he asked for the following reports from staff:

*Acting Director of Public Works Danny Rivas spoke about the fraudulent COVID-19 Testing pop-up tents and canopies in the public right of way and on private property. He advised members of the public to contact the Code Compliance Division at (323) 848-6516. Mr. Rivas shared that these testing sites must operate under a City permit and approved by the Los Angeles County Department of Public Health.*

*Associate Planner David Fenn provided an update on Metro.*

Councilmember Horvath reported her attendance at the SCAG Transportation Committee meeting and the California Contract Cities Board meeting. She referenced an LA Times Editorial Board piece and the City's SCAG representative was quoted in it. She requested that our SCAG representative attend an upcoming meeting, share the comments with the City Council, and allow the City Council an opportunity to ask questions and provide feedback. She commented on Item 2.N. noting that this will extend public Wi-Fi for residents. Regarding Item 2.K., she inquired about the City's plan when the moratorium is and requested that the City Manager return with an item addressing this and the possible creation of a City Council subcommittee to work on this issue with the County and State to ensure that people can remain housed. She indicated her support for Items 2.R. and 2.S. She mentioned correspondence received and requested that the City revisit ALPR cameras and possible inclusion in the comprehensive update on public safety.

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Mayor Meister reported on her attendance at the Chamber of Commerce Leadership meeting, the Plummer Park Subcommittee meeting, the Emerald Village meeting, Southern California Association of Governments' CEHD committee meeting as the WSCCOG rep. She noted that at the SCAG CEHD Subcommittee meeting was about several new housing finance programs, specifically ADUs. She commented that she would like to have a City Council Study Session meeting on policy updates on housing by including SCAG, California League of Cities, and Contract Cities as well as City staff, Planning Commissioners, and Historic Preservation Commissioners. She requested that Councilmember Erickson co-sponsor the item with her and he agreed. She mentioned Item 2.K. and confirmed with the City Attorney that individuals still must pay their rent or repaying back rent and that this item ensures that no fault eviction protections are in place. City Attorney Langer confirmed this information. For Item 2.R., she congratulated the vendors on their award of the development grants. She mentioned Item 2.S. and thanked her colleagues for their support on this Item. Also, on Item 2.U., she shared that she was unclear on speaker attendance policies and payment of international travel. She indicated her support of Item 5.C. Black History Month; however, she expressed concern with one of the recommendations, potential conflicts of interest, and noted her Abstention vote on the Item. Lastly, she thanked Councilmember Erickson and Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne for Item 5.D. She noted several upcoming events and encouraged the community to visit the calendar on the City's website for additional information.

#### **CITY MANAGER'S REPORT:**

City Manager Wilson reiterated City Clerk Crowder's comments during Approval of the Agenda that representatives from Cedars-Sinai would speak briefly on Item 4.A. as it pertains to Cedars Sinai Emergency Room protocols when a patient alleges that a sexual assault occurred. Dr. Torbati provided this information on behalf of the Cedars Sinai Emergency Department and responded to City Council questions.

*Councilmember Erickson continued his Councilmember comments. He requested an audit of the City's street lighting on residential streets, as some residents have shared that their streets are not well lit. He also requested a comprehensive speed study and if certain speed limits should be reduced. He mentioned the incident at a Texas synagogue over the weekend and noted the increased safety education for our local Jewish organizations. Finally, he announced President Biden's free COVID-19 home testing kits and encouraged residents to visit <https://www.covidtests.gov/>.*

City Manager Wilson noted that staff will follow-up on the direction given during Councilmember comments including the crosswalk at Santa Monica Blvd/San Vicente, streetlights, and speed reductions. He indicated that staff would return with an item with recommendations on next steps once the eviction moratorium is lifted. In response to Mayor Pro Tempore's comments regarding the ADA spaces at the Library parking structure, he commented that ADA parking spots were added to the 3<sup>rd</sup> floor to provide access to the bridge between the parking structure and the Library. He shared that two animal vaccination clinics took place at Plummer Park and that the City plans to host another pet vaccination clinic in April. He reported that the City continues to monitor the

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Omicron variant and will continue to meet via teleconference until the end of January. Currently, City Hall is scheduled to reopen on January 31<sup>st</sup> for in-person appointments.

## **FISCAL IMPACT ON CONSENT CALENDAR:**

City Clerk Crowder stated that the fiscal impact on the Consent Calendar with the removal of Item 2.U. and the addition of Items 5.B., 5.C., and 5.D. is \$794,964 in expenditures, \$0 in potential revenues, and (\$2,050) in waived fees.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne disclosed that she met with members of the Sierra Club.

Associate Planner Paige Portwood provided background information as outlined in the staff report dated January 18, 2022.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne inquired about education for the public. Ms. Portwood responded.

BARBARA HENSLEIGH, LA CHAPTER/SIERRA CLUB, spoke in support of the item and thanked Shyne, Erickson, and staff for their work for their environment.

GENEVIEVE MORRILL, WEST HOLLYWOOD CHAMBER OF COMMERCE, spoke in support of the item but requested more time on the phased approach for businesses.

PAUL LEWIS, LA CHAPTER/SIERRA CLUB, spoke in support of the item and requested that the implementation date be moved up to January 1, 2023.

RAJ PATEL, LA CHAPTER SIERRA CLUB, spoke in support of the item and requested that the implementation date for large businesses be moved up to January 1, 2023.

DANIELLE WILSON, UNITE HERE LOCAL 11, spoke in support of the item as well as supporting Sierra Club's request to move up the implementation date.

ZACH LLOYD, LA CHAPTER SIERRA CLUB, spoke to echo support for the item and thanked the Councilmembers who introduced the ordinance.

MARQUITA THOMAS, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item and to allow longer implementation time for businesses to adjust.

ZEKIAH WRIGHT, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item and highlighted that large companies are the major polluters.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne asked for the difference between the types of businesses and phases, what staff is doing in the 90-day period, and what is the exemption. Ms. Portwood responded.

Mayor Meister closed the public hearing.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne made a motion to approve the item with a revision to the recommendations amending the definition of foodware and foodware accessories to align with the State's definition and change the implementation for large businesses to January 1, 2023. Councilmember Erickson seconded the motion.

Mayor Meister inquired how many businesses this change would affect. Mr. Rivas responded.

Councilmember Horvath commented on her visit to Athens, learning about their "MRF'g" (Materials Recovery Facility) practices, and the amount of trash she observed during her visit. She is supportive of Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne's amendments to the ordinance. She shared her interest in a cost-effective way to "yes" for the City's businesses.

Mayor Meister inquired about waivers for businesses. Mr. Rivas responded.

City Attorney Langer requested that Mr. Rivas read the ordinance changes into the record. Mr. Rivas read the following into the record:

In Section 15.76.030(a) remove the reference to May 31, 2023 and change it to "December 31, 2022".

In Section 15.76.020(f) add a new Subsection (5) to include the following single-use foodware accessory items:

5. Plates, napkins, cup lids, cup sleeves, food or beverage trays, condiment packets and saucers, spill plugs, and toothpicks.

- 3.B. **APPEAL OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION'S APPROVAL OF THE DEMOLITION OF AN EXISTING TWO-STORY COMMERCIAL BUILDING TO CONSTRUCT A THREE-STORY, 11-UNIT MULTI-FAMILY DEVELOPMENT OVER SUBTERRANEAN PARKING LOCATED AT 8760 SHOREHAM DRIVE, WEST HOLLYWOOD, CALIFORNIA (INCLUDING A FINDING THAT THE PROJECT IS EXEMPT FROM CEQA UNDER A CLASS 32 CATEGORICAL**

**EXEMPTION FOR IN-FILL DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS (14 CCR § 15332)) [J. KEHO, J. ALKIRE, D. PURIFICACION]:**

*SUBJECT: This item is regarding an appeal of the Planning Commission's approval of Resolution No. PC 21-1409 for the demolition of an existing two-story commercial building to construct a three-story, 11-unit multi-family development over subterranean parking located at 8760 Shoreham Drive (including a determination that the project is exempt from CEQA under 14 CCR 15332). This item was continued from the November 1, 2021, City Council meeting to address an error found on the mailed public notice, which was corrected, and new notices were sent for the continued hearing.*

Mayor Meister opened the public hearing.

Councilmember Horvath disclosed that she spoke to the appellant as well as supporters of the appellant. She also spoke with the applicant.

Councilmember Erickson disclosed he visited the site and spoke to the appellant as well as residents in the neighborhood. He also spoke with the developer of the project.

Mayor Meister disclosed that she spoke to the appellant at end of October when the appeal was originally noticed and has driven by the site.

City Clerk Crowder reported that the Public Hearing was noticed as required by law.

Current & Historic Preservation Planning Manager Jennifer Alkire provided background information as outlined in the staff report dated January 18, 2022.

On behalf of the appellants, Frank P. Angel provided the reasons that the City Council should approve the appeal.

On behalf of the applicant, Nicki Carlsen spoke regarding the inaccuracies presented in the appeal and requested that the City Council uphold the Planning Commission's approval.

Councilmember Erickson inquired about the Ficus trees as mentioned by Mr. Angel during his comments. Ms. Alkire responded.

DEBORAH CALLAHAN, SUNSET PLAZA HOA, spoke in support of the appeal.

SUE BUCKNER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the appeal.

WHITNEY SPRINGER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the appeal.

BARRY SCOTT, APPELLANT, spoke about the appeal and why the City Council should approve the appeal.

City Clerk Crowder noted that because Mr. Scott was provided time to present his appeal, she inquired if the Applicant would also like to provide additional comment. Ms. Carlsen, on behalf of the applicant, indicated that she would wait until the formal rebuttal period.

The rebuttal on behalf of the appellant was provided by Mr. Angel.

The rebuttal on behalf of the applicant was provided by Ms. Carlsen.

Councilmember Horvath inquired if this site was previously a commercial property. Ms. Alkire confirmed that it was converted to commercial in the 90's.

Mayor Meister closed the public hearing. She stated that she did not find the Appellant's arguments compelling and the project could be much larger under today's housing laws.

Councilmember Horvath inquired about a statement in the staff report regarding the reporting process that noted that if a female victim prefers a female deputy that one will be made available. She commented that she wants to ensure that this same consideration be provided to our trans and gender non-conforming community members. Lt. Moulder responded.

Councilmember Erickson suggested a victims' advocate resource that works through all the bureaucracy as mentioned by one of the public commenters.

Mayor Meister asked about training for the bars and clubs on sexual assault recognition as well as training on over-serving. Ms. Cook responded.

JACKIE STEELE, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about the work currently being done by the Lesbian and Gay Advisory Board to address this issue. She also mentioned the data in the staff report.

JORDAN DAVID, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about utilizing the proposed behavioral response team as the first responder for sexual assault cases as opposed to law enforcement.

Councilmember D'Amico inquired about the number of reported incidents versus the number of prosecuted cases. Lt. Moulder responded.

Mayor Meister requested a site tour of the Santa Monica Rape Treatment Center and inviting one of their representatives to speak at a future City Council meeting.

**ACTIONS:** 1) The City Council received an update on sexual assault reporting and procedures; and 2) Provided additional direction to staff.

**4.B. PROJECT LABOR AGREEMENT BY AND BETWEEN THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD AND THE LOS ANGELES/ORANGE COUNTIES BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION TRADES COUNCIL AND**

**SIGNATORY CRAFT COUNCILS AND UNIONS [J. LEONARD, B. LEAGUE, O. DELGADO]:**

*SUBJECT: The City Council will consider directing the City Manager to execute a Project Labor Agreement (Attachment B) with the Los Angeles and Orange Counties Building and Construction Trades Council and Signatory Craft Councils and Unions for certain City capital improvement construction projects.*

Property Development Manager Brian League provided background information as outlined in the staff report dated January 18, 2022.

CHRIS HANNAN, LA/OC B&C TRADES COUNCIL, spoke in support of the item.

ZEKIAH WRIGHT, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of this item.

Mayor Meister asked when Project Labor Agreements would go into effect and if additional staffing is needed to ensure compliance. Director of Economic Development John Leonard responded.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne made a motion to lower the threshold for single-trade or specialty to \$100,000 and multi-trade to \$750,000 as well as changing the effective date to July 1, 2022. Councilmember Horvath seconded the motion.

**ACTIONS:** Direct the City Manager to execute the attached Project Labor Agreement with the Los Angeles and Orange Counties Building and Construction Trades Council and Signatory Craft Councils and Unions for City capital improvement construction projects over \$100,000 for a single trade and \$750,000 for multiple trades in construction valuation for an initial term of five years beginning July 1, 2022. **Motion by Mayor Pro Tempore, seconded by Councilmember Horvath, and approved.**

**4.C. APPOINTMENTS TO THE HUMAN SERVICES COMMISSION AND TRANSGENDER ADVISORY BOARD [J. JIMENEZ, M. CROWDER, A. POBLADOR]:**

*SUBJECT: Mayor Meister will make her direct appointment to the Human Services Commission and the City Council will consider making an at-large appointment to the Transgender Advisory Board.*

**ACTIONS:** 1) Mayor Meister appointed **Sam Borelli** to the Human Services Commission for a term ending February 28, 2023; and 2) The City Council appointed **Nik Kacy** to the Transgender Advisory Board for a term ending February 28, 2023.

**5. NEW BUSINESS:**

**5.A. DIRECTION TO STOP OR REDUCE THE ENFORCEMENT OF MINOR, LOW LEVEL TRAFFIC STOPS [S. SHYNE, L. HORVATH, Y. QUARKER, A. LOVANO]:**

*SUBJECT: The City Council will consider directing the City Attorney to analyze options for stopping or reducing the enforcement of minor, low level traffic stops. This may include banning the enforcement of low-level traffic stops completely or adopting a resolution declaring that enforcement of low level traffic stops will be a low priority for law enforcement in the City of West Hollywood.*

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne and Councilmember Horvath provided background information as outlined in the staff report dated January 18, 2022.

Mayor Meister mentioned the pending report from the Center for Policing Equity (CPE) and inquired as to why we are not waiting for that report. Councilmember Horvath responded.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne touched upon multiple data points regarding the disproportionate number of Black, Brown, and Trans individuals stopped by law enforcement.

Mayor Meister inquired about the priority level the West Hollywood Sheriff's Station places on these types of traffic stops currently. Ms. Cook responded that the two traffic motor officers issue most of the traffic citations, not patrol deputies.

JACKIE STEELE, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item.

JORDAN DAVID, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item.

ROBERT OLIVER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about addressing public safety in a holistic way by fixing policy.

TOD HALLMAN, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke of a personal experience when he was pulled over by law enforcement.

CHARLIE JASPER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in opposition to the item.

ZEKIAH WRIGHT, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item and shared a personal story regarding a traffic stop incident.

Councilmember D'Amico made a motion directing the City Attorney to work with the Public Safety Department to develop policies and/or a

resolution. In addition, the policies and/or resolution that is drafted by the City Attorney and the Public Safety Department go to the Public Safety Commission before returning to the City Council for consideration. Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne seconded the motion.

Councilmember Erickson addressed some of the written correspondence and clarified that the item directs the City Attorney to draft a resolution based on this evening's discussion. The proposed resolution will return at a future City Council meeting for formal consideration.
