**CALL TO ORDER:** Mayor Meister called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

**PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE:** Katie del Ponte led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**REPORT OF CLOSED SESSION AGENDA:**

City Attorney Langer reported that the Closed Session was called to order at 5:30 p.m. She stated that no members of the public spoke under public comment. The City Council discussed the one item of business on the posted agenda and took no reportable action.

Councilmember Erickson requested that Items 5.A. and 6.B. be moved to the Consent Calendar as Items 2.Z. and 2.BB., respectively.

Mayor Meister requested that Section 2 (changing the start time of City Council meetings) of the Ordinance for Item 6.B. be Tabled.

Councilmember Horvath requested that Item 6.A. be moved to the Consent Calendar as Item 2.AA.

Mayor Meister requested that Item 4.A. be moved to the Consent Calendar as Item 2.Y.

**Motion by Councilmember Horvath, seconded by Councilmember D’Amico to approve the October 17, 2022 Agenda as amended.**

**PRESENTATIONS:**

Mayor Meister presented a plaque to Assemblymember Richard Bloom in recognition of his years of service.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne and Councilmember Horvath presented plaques to the Social Justice Task Force Members in recognition of their work.

**1. PUBLIC COMMENT:**

RICK WATTS, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about Disabilities Awareness Month and promoted the upcoming vaccine clinic on Thursday, October 20<sup>th</sup> at Plummer Park.

MISS TIGER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about the last City Council meeting and comments made from the dais.

ESTHER BAUM, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in opposition to a 6% increase in rent for seniors.

STEPHANIE HARKER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke regarding Item 2.D. and encouraged access to meeting recordings. She also spoke in opposition to Item 2.G. and in support of Item 2.H.

STEVE MARTIN, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in opposition to bike lanes on Fountain, reduction in the number of West Hollywood Sheriff's Deputies, and his City Councilmember campaign.

MARY GROVER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about small landlords and in opposition to Item 2.AA. (6.A.).

E.W. GROVER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in opposition to Item 2.AA. (6.A.).

VICTOR OMELCZENKO, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about the removal of political signs from local businesses and front yards.

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DANNY HANG, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of Items 2.U., 2.V., 2.W., 2.X., and 2.AA. (6.A.).

MJ GODGES, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about bees in the ARC swimming pool and the protection of hives by the City's Facilities Division.

WEST SEEGMILLER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of Items 2.W. and 4.D.

MAX SHERMAN, ON BEHALF OF THE APARTMENT ASSOCIATION OF GREATER LOS ANGELES, spoke in opposition to Item 2.AA. (6.A.).

SANJAY GAUR, UNKNOWN, spoke about his candidacy for the West Basin Municipal Water District (Division IV) Board of Directors and the California drought.

### **COUNCILMEMBER COMMENTS AND MEETING ATTENDANCE REPORTS:**

Councilmember Horvath shared Governor Newsom's announcement regarding the end of the declared emergency as of February 2023 and requested that staff return with an update on implications to the City's declared emergency. She indicated her abstention on Item 2.H. She reported attendance at the SCAG Transportation Committee meeting, the Metro K Line opening of Crenshaw, the Liability Trust Fund meeting, and the AIDS Walk. With regard to Item 4.A., she requested that the City Playhouse City Manager's Advisory Group continue to work with the consultant and City staff. She recognized the Aquatics and Recreation Center's (ARC) LEED Gold certification. Lastly, she gave a shoutout to Lyric Rouse Ringo for her appearance on the TV show Abbott Elementary.

Councilmember Erickson thanked his colleagues for their support on Items 2.U., 2.V., 2.W., and 2.X. He encouraged participation at tomorrow's Proposition 1 Town Hall at 7:00 PM in Council Chambers. He reported his attendance at the WeHo Reads Poet Laureate Across America, the SCAG Energy Committee and Regional Committee, Saturdays with John at Plummer Park, CicLAvia "Heart of LA", West Hollywood Food Coalition facility tour, Laughter on the Lawn, and AIDS Walk Los Angeles. He expressed gratitude towards the members of the Social Justice Task Force and their service to the community. He thanked the City for distributing more GHB test strips and reminded the community to get their flu shot and COVID booster. Lastly, he requested a report from the Assistant City Manager on public safety measures for Halloween.

Councilmember D'Amico thanked the Social Justice Task Force for their work and highlighted his appointee, Jonathan Wilson. He thanked his colleagues for Item 2.V. He commented on Item 4.A. and requested that staff return with an item listing all of the current Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) and who is managing the projects. He expressed concern with staff's capacity and would like the City Council to discuss it. He suggested that staff explore partnering with other westside cities so that resources can be pooled. He concluded that his goal is to appropriately support City staff so the projects are successfully managed.

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Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne commented on the racist and homophobic comments made by Los Angeles City Councilmembers Nury Martinez, Gil Cedillo, and Kevin De Leon as well as Ron Herrera of the LA County Federation of Labor. She called for the resignations of Gil Cedillo and Kevin De Leon, noting that Nury Martinez and Ron Herrera have resigned since the comments were leaked. She reported her attendance at the Westside Cities Council of Governments Board meeting. She also reported her attendance at the Los Angeles County Democratic Party 2022 Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt Awards where she was recognized as Democrat of the Year for Assembly District 51. She attended the AIDS Walk Breakfast and Kickoff and the West Hollywood Aquatics 40<sup>th</sup> Year Anniversary Banquet. She thanked her colleagues for approving Items 2.W. and 2.V. and indicated her support of Item 6.A.

Mayor Meister reported her attendance at the WSCCOG, SCAG CEHD Committee, Community Academy and CERT program, Land Economics weekend, and the AIDS Walk. She indicated her “no” vote on Item 2.E. She commented on Item 2.I. noting that she is available to meet with any of the LGBTQ+ Advisory Boardmembers to further discuss the new commission’s purview. She commented on several Consent Calendar items. She requested that staff reach out to the Grover’s who spoke under Public Comment to provide information regarding the Mills Act. She thanked the Social Justice Task Force, particularly her appointee Shannon Morton and Black Women Lead. She mentioned several upcoming City events and encouraged members of the public to review the City calendar by visiting [www.weho.org/calendar](http://www.weho.org/calendar). Finally, she requested that staff reach out to residents adjacent to the City Playhouse since they have expressed concerns about the outside performance space.

**CITY MANAGER’S REPORT:**

Assistant City Manager Delgado announced the community forum on Proposition 1 taking place tomorrow as well as the Great California ShakeOut Earthquake Drill on Thursday, October 20 at 10:20 a.m. He addressed Councilmember Horvath’s comment about the Governor’s announcement to rescind the declared emergency noting that an item will be coming to the City Council in November. He acknowledged Councilmember D’Amico and Mayor Meister’s suggestions on Item 4.A.

Community Safety Director Danny Rivas provided an update on the public safety plan for Halloween.

**FISCAL IMPACT ON CONSENT CALENDAR:**

City Clerk Crowder stated that the fiscal impact on the Consent Calendar with the addition of Items 4.A., 5.A., 6.A., and 6.B. (Section 2.08.030 only) is \$8,994,548 in expenditures, \$0 in revenues, and (\$40,545) in waived fees. She read the titles of the Ordinances into the record for Items 6.A. and 6.B.

**4.B. REPLACEMENT OF ABOVE LOWER INCOME UNITS IN NEW HOUSING PROJECTS [J. KEHO, F. CONTRERAS, J. ALKIRE, J. LEONARD, A. BARTLE]:**

*SUBJECT: The City Council will consider adopting a policy making an election under state law to require replacement units to be affordable if the units that are being demolished are or were rent-controlled and occupied by an individual or household earning above lower income (greater than 80% of area median income).*

Planning and Development Services Director John Keho provided background information as outlined in the staff report dated October 17, 2022.

Mayor Meister inquired if the above income level rent stabilized units start at market rate. Mr. Keho confirmed that they do. She asked if in 2019 the Planning Commission recommended that the units be 100% deed

restricted affordable units rather than rent stabilized. Mr. Keho responded to this inquiry.

Councilmember Horvath inquired if it would make more sense to conduct the study first rather than the City Council making a policy decision now. Mr. Keho commented that there are development applications and staff needs direction now.

STEPHANIE HARKER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item and commented that it should have been done sooner.

ED LEVIN, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of a study to understand potential impacts.

STEVE MARTIN, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item and commented that it should have been done sooner.

ERICK MATOS, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of a study and highlighted Alternative 1.

VICTOR OMELCZENKO, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item.

*Citizen Position Slip – Judson Feder in support of the item.*

Councilmember Erickson commented on the risk of development decreasing based on this policy. Project Development Administrator Alicen Bartle mentioned that the City is trying to find the balance of preserving and building.

A brief discussion ensued regarding the Builders Remedy.

Mayor Meister indicated she is not in favor of conducting a study when we already know that the state crafted the code realizing that the replacement requirements might disincentivize some new development. She suggested that staff do a study to figure out how to help small mom and pop apartment building owners. She noted that allowing any of the one-for-one replacements to be rent stabilized rather than affordable is not providing affordable housing. Rent stabilizing a new unit starting at \$3,500 a month is not affordable. She added that we should be protecting our residents in rent stabilized buildings and creating the types of units we need, and that this state law provides a tool to do that.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne commented that tonight's policy decision is temporary while a study is conducted. Once the study is completed, the Planning Commission will review a Zone Text Amendment which would

then come before the City Council for formal consideration. She indicated that Alternative 1 seems the best option.

City Attorney Langer read the changes to the Resolution into the record. Add the following language to Section 1 of the Resolution "if the deed-restricted units would result in not more than 35% of the total units in the project being deed-restricted any other replacement units would be subject to rent stabilization requirements."

STEPHANIE HARKER, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in support of the item and requested the enforcement of off-leash rules in Plummer Park.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne indicated her preference for turf rather than wood chips at the dog park.

Councilmember D'Amico noted his support for turf.

Mayor Meister inquired about the cost difference between wood chips versus turf. She also indicated that she is in favor of turf. Facilities and Field Services Manager Helen Collins responded to this inquiry. Urban Design and Architecture Studio Manager Ric Abramson commented that if the City Council chooses turf then shade structures need to be installed as well.

Councilmember Erickson asked about the project timeline difference if the City Council chooses to move forward with turf rather than wood chips.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne moved to fast-track the pilot program, to utilize turf with the drainage system, as well as the addition of tree shading.

**ACTIONS:** 1) Direct staff to fast track the project design of the dog park using turf; 2) Authorize the Director of Finance & Technology Services to allocate \$100,000 from unallocated reserves in the General Fund for the design of the pilot off-leash area; and 3) Direct staff to return with the award of the construction agreement and allocation of funds for the project. **Motion by Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne, seconded by Councilmember Horvath, and approved.**

Community & Legislative Affairs Manager Andi Lovano provided background information as outlined in the staff report dated October 17, 2022.

JONATHAN WILSON, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke in thanks for being granted the role as chair of the task force and reminded all of the sense of urgency in this work.

VICTOR OMELCZENKO, WEST HOLLYWOOD, spoke about the recommendations of the task force, particularly about SB 330.

Councilmember Erickson thanked staff for their work on the task force, the task force for their valuable recommendations, as well as thanks to the facilitator. He expressed a desire for the task force to become a permanent body.

Councilmember Horvath indicated she would like to see each recommendation made by the Social Justice Task Force assigned to individual department directors to become part of their work plan, based on purview, with regular status updates quarterly being brought to Council as a receive and file for accountability and transparency.

Councilmember D'Amico commented that the task force should be a permanent board.

Mayor Pro Tempore Shyne agreed with her colleagues' comments and recommended that the Social Justice Task Force become the Social Justice Advisory Board as a permanent body.

Mayor Meister thanked the Social Justice Task Force for their work and confirmed next steps would include the City Attorney's office.

**ACTIONS:** 1) Receive and file the final report and recommendations from the Social Justice Task Force; 2) Thank the Social Justice Task Force Members for their work and disband the Task Force; and 3) Direct staff to return in January with an item creating a Social Justice Advisory Board to meet on a quarterly basis with the first meeting to occur in March 2023 after the appointment process in February 2023. **Motion by Mayor Pro Tempore, seconded by Councilmember Horvath, and approved.**
