

**MINUTES
CITY COUNCIL MEETING
MARCH 4, 1991
WEST HOLLYWOOD PARK

6:00 P.M. - CLOSED SESSION: Mayor Heilman called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. and adjourned to a closed session to discuss matters pertaining to litigation, potential litigation, personnel, and/or claims.

6:30 P.M. - STUDY SESSION: This time has been set aside for staff to answer questions from Council about Consent Calendar items on the agenda. (Study session was not held.)

7:00 P.M. - REGULAR MEETING

CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Heilman called the meeting to order at 7:10 p.m. and announced that the Council had met in closed session to discuss matters of litigation, potential litigation, and personnel. The Mayor announced that tonight's meeting will be adjourned to a closed session on Thursday, March 7, at 4:00 p.m. to discuss litigation and pending litigation.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE: The Pledge was led by John Altschul.

APPROVAL OF AGENDA: ACTIONS: Pull 2i, 2j, 2l; table 2n at request of staff. Hearing no other changes or additions, the agenda was approved as amended. By consensus.

PROCLAMATIONS AND COMMENDATIONS: Mayor Heilman announced that a proclamation would be given tomorrow to Edison.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT: This time has been set aside for the City Manager to report to the City Council on any or all matters of importance. The City Manager reported that a code enforcement officer had been out over the weekend to do code enforcement, and this would be pursued on an ongoing basis. The City Manager also reported that there have been changes in parking enforcement, because in the past there have been deficiencies. Enforcement is back to above level it was last year. City Manager Brotzman also reported on some water pipes which were near breakage, and that there would be a meeting with the City of Beverly Hills regarding changes in water conservation issues. The City is also looking at an urban design process, similar to that used by City of L.A. for Farmer's Market; the business community to finance.

1. CITIZEN COMMENTS: This time has been set aside for members of

the public to address the City Council on items of importance, including the Consent Calendar, but not including public hearings. The following persons came forward to address the City Council:

Ernie Over, W.H., member, Lesbian and Gay Advisory Council: Recommend sending a letter to W.H. Post urging them to publish a series of anti-homophobia ads.

Michael Yates, of Christopher Street West: The City of W.H. is very fortunate to have such a group of caring people leading it. Also urge your support of L&GAC recommendation.

Mike Radcliffe, W.H.: Re. article in the Independent re. budget shortfalls. Those articles unacceptable to the Business community. Urged Council to promote shopping in W.H. Critized hiring caterers from outside the City.

Babetta, Sorcerer's Shop: Planning Commission wants to redo my storefront. Opposed; would damage my business.

(Mayor Heilman asked Babetta to speak to Debbie Potter.)

Jamie Wolf: Representing W.H. _____ League. Hart Park.

(Councilmember Koretz asked the City Manager about this. City Manager Brotzman said that the project preceded the organization. We are rebidding the same project that was originally approved. What they want would require substantial redesign. It may require perhaps three or four months additional time on project depending on review required by the State, etc. Councilmember Koretz wanted to get more information in the next two weeks. Mayor Heilman was opposed to delaying the project.)

Martin Strudler, Pres., W.H. West Assoc.: Regarding water table. Mr. Strudler read a letter threatening a class action suit.

Fred Mashion, W.H. Community Alliance and Business Council: Re. cruisers in the neighborhood.

Clay Swidler: Regarding noise pollution--Harley Davidson motorcycles.

Kevin Notre, W.H.: Regarding domestic partnerships--now couples can use The Post to announce domestic partnerships.

Jeanne Dobrin: Illegal signs and code enforcement.

f. Second Reading of Ordinance No. 284 - Adopting a New Zoning Ordinance: ACTION: To adopt on second reading Ordinance No. 284, "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD ADOPTING A NEW ARTICLE IX, ZONING ORDINANCE, AND AMENDING THE WEST HOLLYWOOD MUNICIPAL CODE." Approved as part of the Consent Calendar.

g. Mike Radcliffe, West Hollywood: A group of people retained a consulting firm to do a study. Would be wise of the Council to work with that study result before proceeding.

Debbie Potter of Community Development Department gave the staff report.

ACTION: Authorize the City Manager to enter into a \$9,600 contract with Jan Breidenbach, Consultant, to conduct an entertainment industry retention study, contingent upon the review of the study which has already been done to see if money can be saved.
Motion Land, second Koretz. Hearing no objection it was so ordered.

j. Designation of Adobe Structure (Including Interior and Landscape) at 916 Genesee Avenue as a Local Cultural Resource: REMOVED FOR SEPARATE DISCUSSION BUT LISTED HERE FOR CLARITY. Mayor Heilman asked staff in the future to indicate whether the owner is in favor of the designation. Direction was given to staff to work with the owner on the landscaping.

ACTION: Adopt Resolution No. 817, "A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD ADOPTING THE NOMINATION BY THE CULTURAL HERITAGE ADVISORY BOARD AND THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION TO DESIGNATE THE STRUCTURE, INTERIOR AND LANDSCAPING AT 916 GENESEE AVENUE, WEST HOLLYWOOD, AS A CULTURAL RESOURCE." Motion Lang, second Koretz. Hearing no objection it was so ordered.

k. Designation of Two Commercial Structures Located at 8811 and 8851 Santa Monica Blvd. as Local Cultural Resources:

ACTION: Adopt Resolution No. 818, "A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD ADOPTING THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE CULTURAL HERITAGE ADVISORY BOARD AND THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION TO DESIGNATE THE STRUCTURE LOCATED AT 8811 SANTA MONICA BOULEVARD, WEST HOLLYWOOD, AS A CULTURAL RESOURCE," and adopt Resolution No. 819, "A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD ADOPTING THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE CULTURAL HERITAGE ADVISORY BOARD AND THE RECOMMENDATION OF THE PLANNING COMMISSION TO DESIGNATE THE STRUCTURE LOCATED AT 8851 SANTA MONICA BOULEVARD, WEST HOLLYWOOD, AS A CULTURAL RESOURCE." Approved as part of the Consent Calendar.

l. Christopher Street West: REMOVED FOR SEPARATE DISCUSSION BUT LISTED HERE FOR CLARITY. Direction was given to Human Services Director Long to work with Business Licensing staff to make sure that the application is filed within the correct time period. Direction was given to Human Services Director to work with Nancy Greenstein and CSW on some kind of program to limit problems which occurred last year such as drunkenness and drunk driving. Councilmember Land asked that an addition be made to have CSW work with Environmental Services Division to do on-site recycling and use the paper goods allowed by the City. Human Services Director Long explained an addition that had been

made to the agreement, regarding a final walk-through with CSW, after the event, and then releasing them from liability.

The following persons addressed the Council:

Ernie Over: Gay and Lesbian Council supports the request from CSW.

Jeanne Dobrin: Glad the Mayor brought up the complaints we received last year. They shouldn't be allowed to sell beer and wine. Re. Parking rates at PDC--should be same low rates as usually charged.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: 1) Approve the use of West Hollywood Park for the 1991 Gay and Lesbian Pride Festival (Friday, June 21 to Tuesday, June 25, 1991) and authorize the City Manager to sign the agreement permitting said use; 2) Authorize the use of Santa Monica Blvd. between Crescent Heights Blvd. and Robertson Blvd. for the 1991 Gay and Lesbian Pride Parade (June 23, 1991); and 3) Agree that the City of West Hollywood will serve as an official sponsor for both events.

ACTION: To approve the recommendations as modified. Motion Land, second Koretz. Hearing no objection it was so ordered.

m. Tri-Cities Agreement Regarding Traffic Study:

ACTION: 1) Approve the proposed Memorandum of Understanding for the Tri-Cities Comprehensive Transportation Improvement Study; 2) Approve the proposed Agreement Between the City of Beverly Hills, City of Los Angeles, City of West Hollywood, and the Team of Kaku Associates and Korve Engineering Inc. to Prepare a Transportation Study and a Transportation Improvement and Mitigation Program for Portions of the City of Beverly Hills and City of Los Angeles and the Entire City of West Hollywood.

Approved as part of the Consent Calendar.

n. Approval of Contract, State Department of Aging: THIS ITEM WAS PULLED FROM THE AGENDA AT REQUEST OF STAFF.

o. Resolution Regarding Metro-Rail: ACTION: Adopt Resolution No. 820, "A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD URGING THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY TRANSPORTATION COMMISSION TO SUPPORT THE SANTA MONICA BOULEVARD ALIGNMENT ALTERNATIVE FOR THE PROPOSED WESTERN EXTENSION OF THE METRO-RAIL ORANGE LINE."

Approved as part of the Consent Calendar.

p. Fountain Ave. Traffic Signal Controllers (CIP #836), Funding for Design Revisions: ACTION: Authorize the City Manager to amend the City's contract for design services with Harris & Associates in an amount not to exceed \$2,000, and direct the Finance Division to transfer \$2,000 from account No. 01-810-40-502 to account No. 41-999-92-906.

Approved as part of the Consent Calendar.

q. Award of Informal Bid for New Copying Equipment:

ACTION: Award the bid for the purchase of one (1) Konica 3035 copier in the amount of \$8,533.18 to Image IV of Burbank, CA.

Appropriate \$8,533.18 from the undesignated general fund balance to account 01-600-820-825, miscellaneous office equipment, for this purchase.

Approved as part of the Consent Calendar.

r. Award of Sealed Bid for Maintenance Supplies: ACTION: Award the bid for the purchase of maintenance supplies in the amount of \$16,853.20 to Maintex.
Approved as part of the Consent Calendar.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

3. APPEAL OF A DENIAL FOR AN ENCROACHMENT PERMIT AT 1211 N. SUNSET PLAZA DRIVE: The Deputy City Clerk reported that a notice of public hearing had been published in The Post Newspaper on February 22, and that notice was posted at City Hall, the Library, the Sheriff's Station and Plummer Park. In addition, Transportation staff had done a mailing to the neighborhood.

Chris Patrouch of Transportation Department gave the staff report, and stated that the staff recommendation is to open the public hearing, accept testimony, and to deny the applicant's appeal for an encroachment permit, provided that action is supported by the record and testimony.

Mr. Roger Sullivan, 800 S. Figueroa, legal representative for Montgomery Management, spoke in favor of the encroachment permit. Mr. Sullivan also requested two minutes for rebuttal at the end of the hearing.

Mayor Heilman opened the public hearing and the following persons came forward to address the Council:

Sibyl Zaden, Pres., Shoreham Hts. Neighborhood Assoc.: We are unanimously opposed.

Linda Newmark: Own a condo on Shoreham Dr. Opposed.

Brooke Wolford: Opposed.

Clay Swidler: Sunset Terrace Homeowners Assoc: All tenants and members opposed.

Stan Wojno, Shoreham Dr.: Second Sybil Zaden's opposition.

John Altschul, W.H.: (Read a letter on behalf of Spago Restaurant, in opposition.) Also spoke on his own behalf, and his neighborhood association, in opposition.

Richard Maggio, W.H.: Opposed.

Ms. Ronnie Kaufman, W.H.: Opposed.

Jim Hooker, Shoreham Dr.: Opposed.

Doris Romeo, W.H.: Opposed.

David Weissfeld, W.H.: Opposed.

Mary Honore: 8770 Shoreham Dr. Opposed.

Ruth Komer, Vice Pres. Shoreham Heights Assoc.: We are all opposed. We were not consulted about the encroachment on our street.

Don Baldwin: Opposed.

Thomas Jones: Live on N. Harper. Opposed.
Jeanne Dobrin, W.H.: Opposed.

Mr. Sullivan: (Rebuttal) Called on Mike Bates, Korve engineer who prepared traffic assessment, to respond to some of the comments.

Mayor Heilman questioned Mr. Bates about the number of actual residents who would use the driveway.

Mr. Sullivan stated: that there would be a very minimal additional traffic, and that if this apartment house was in West Hollywood, the Council would not have heard this number of complaints; the property owner had nothing to say about being in Los Angeles; that it is of benefit to the City is not a proper criteria; there is no significant impact, and it is a property right, and a constitutional right.

Mayor Heilman requested that the City Attorney give advice before the Council takes action.

City Attorney Jenkins commented: "First, it's my understanding this traffic report was submitted after the deadline staff had given the applicant. Staff has not had opportunity to review. Their attorney has made legal arguments tonight for the first time. The applicant has arranged for a court reporter to be here--the implications of which are obvious. In view of the circumstances, it is not prudent for Council to discuss this tonight or take action prior to my written opinion. Ultimately I will provide a legal opinion which can be made public. I'm a little concerned about the sequence and the timing of this being brought to the City. The applicant has built this building creating for himself a predicament. Mr. Sullivan has stated the law most advantageously to his client's position. I don't necessarily agree with him. With respect to the discrimination issue, the Council listens to the people who testify, ultimately the Council makes its decision based on the evidence brought before it. If it is an issue (where the boundary of Los Angeles is) in the minds of some of the speakers, that does not mean it is an issue in the minds of staff, Council. My recommendation is to continue the hearing, give direction to staff, direct me to prepare a written legal opinion, and continue the item to a meeting not sooner than one month, and then to deliberate and make a decision."

Councilmember Land asked staff that when we look at this again, have comments on the traffic study.
Mayor Heilman asked staff to explore whether the traffic study factors in the proposed project on the corner of Sunset and Horn.

ACTION: To continue this Item to April 15th, give the City Attorney direction to provide Council with a legal opinion, give Transportation staff direction to do further investigation, and to hold this public hearing open until April 15th. Motion Guarriello,

second Land. Hearing no objection it was so ordered.

Mayor Heilman called a recess at 8:48 p.m., and announced that it was Councilmember Guarriello's birthday, and there was cake available for everyone present.
The meeting was reconvened at 9:00 p.m.

NEW BUSINESS

5. MAINTENANCE MANAGEMENT PLAN RECOMMENDATIONS (FOR PARKS, BUILDINGS AND LANDSCAPE): Cyndy Holtz, Landscape Division, introduced Clay Brown of Ralph Anderson and Associates, who gave a brief report, followed by questions and comments by Council.

ACTION: Approve the recommendations in the Maintenance Management Plan prepared by Ralph Andersen and Associates; authorize staff to proceed with the implementation of the Plan; authorize staff to prepare contract specifications for Building Maintenance Services and Landscape Maintenance Services for bidding purposes, and to advertise for bids for building maintenance and landscape maintenance services as separate contracts; approve the establishment of the positions of Building Maintenance Supervisor and Landscape Maintenance Supervisor; approve and authorize staff to fill the full time Staff Assistant I position; and approve changing the title of the division manager from Landscape Superintendent to Landscape and Buildings Manager.

In addition, the following directions were given to staff: 1) to make sure that Schindler House gets included; 2) to devise some system to lower the cost of re-keying; 3) to consider whether there is a more effective way of graffiti removal; and 4) to work with the Environmental Task Force and use the most environmentally safe fertilizers and pesticides.

Motion Heilman, second Guarriello. Hearing no objection it was so ordered.

6. INSTALLATION OF NO-TURN SIGNS IN GENESEE/SPAULDING NEIGHBORHOOD: Mayor Heilman reported on this item, and explained that basically this would be to install no-turn signs along the alleys and streets there to cut down on neighborhood cruising and prevent the disturbing of the peace and restore quiet to the neighborhood. The following persons came forward to address the City Council:

David Byers, N. Genesee Ave.: In support.

Dean Licitra, Genesee and Lexington, member Sheriff's Conference Committee: Urge if this goes through there be a serious review after six months.

Barry Stich, W.H.: In support.

Amy Lemon, Romaine and Genesee: Urge approve these signs.

John Jones, Romaine and Spaulding: In support.

Following the speakers, Council directed questions to staff.

ACTION: Approve the placement of signs reading "No Turns 10:00 p.m.- 6:00 a.m. Nightly" in the following locations: 1) all 4 corners of the intersection of N. Genesee and the alley just south of Santa Monica Blvd.; 2) all 4 corners of the intersection of N. Genesee and Romaine; 3) the northwest corner of the intersection at N. Genesee and Willoughby; 4) all 4 corners of the intersection of N. Spaulding and Romaine; and 6) the northwest corner of the intersection at N. Spaulding and Willoughby. The signs should be placed at the designated intersections close to the stop sign or where a stop sign would be placed. The dimensions of the signs will be decided by joint agreement between staff and the residents. That the Transportation Department evaluate the signs after six months to assess their suitability.

Motion Land second Guarriello. Hearing no objection it was so ordered.

Further, direction was given to staff to investigate putting in a stop sign at the corner of Genesee and Romaine.

LEGISLATIVE

7. EMERGENCY DROUGHT RESPONSE: Kevin Hendrick, Environmental Services Division, gave the staff report. Mr. Hendrick reported that the City receives its water from L.A. Water and Power on the east side and Beverly Hills Water Department on the west side, which in turn receive their water from the Metropolitan Water District, which receives its water from a combination of the Colorado River and snow runoff from the Sierra Nevada and Mono Lake. Those supplies are very limited, and the utilities and the Water District have adopted mandatory water rationing. Mr. Hendrick outlined the staff recommendations, which would help the City to conserve water, and help residents to avoid the surcharge which would result if they fail to conserve water.

Marney Hull, Rent Stabilization Department, also reported on the landlord/tenant implications, and the issue of a surcharge.

The following person addressed the Council:

Jeanne Dobrin: Very concerned about water conservation.

Mayor Heilman said that there are plans by the environmental task force to go out and distribute the water conservation kits at supermarkets, etc.

At this time there were questions and comments by Council.

ACTIONS: 1) Adopt a City-wide goal of 20% reduction in water use based on use in 1986, effective immediately; 2) Adopt Ordinance No. 287U, "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD IMPLEMENTING AN EMERGENCY WATER CONSERVATION PLAN AND AMENDING THE WEST HOLLYWOOD MUNICIPAL CODE AND DECLARING THE URGENCY THEREOF"; 3) Upgrade the presently authorized Enforcement Assistant to a specialized Environmental Enforcement Inspector; 4) Direct staff to develop a comprehensive water management plan with additional steps to achieve greater water conservation as necessary. Motion Land second Koretz. Hearing no objection it was so ordered.

CITIZEN COMMENTS: There were no members of the public wishing to speak at this time.

COUNCILMEMBERS COMMENTS: This time was set aside for the Councilmembers to direct comments to staff and/or the public on any and all matters of interest.

Councilmember Koretz had a question regarding the water table-- where we are regarding developing the use of that water for watering green spaces, and possible complications with Beverly Hills.

City Manager Brotzman replied that he had discussed the issue with Mark Scott, City Manager of Beverly Hills, and that Beverly Hills might be interested in a joint effort with West Hollywood, tapping the groundwater and utilizing it for irrigation purposes. The issue would be the cost of developing a parallel distribution system.

Councilmember Koretz asked that we look at asking proposed developments in that area to help with funding, as a mitigation measure.

Councilmember Land reported that March is Women's History Month, and that there is a Calendar listing of events on the back table and at City Hall.

Councilmember Land also requested the City Manager to look into ways to provide parking during Westweek, in particular to look at one-day guest passes; also to work with Sheriff's Department to enforce towaway if people park in red zones and in front of driveways. Direction was given for the issue to come back in two weeks (the 18th), especially one-day guest passes.

Councilmember Guarriello commented that his best birthday present is that the war is over in the Persian Gulf. He also asked that something be done for our servicemen, and servicewomen, who had served in the Gulf, and staff was directed to look into that.

Mayor Heilman asked that staff be directed to accept an application for a T.U.P. (temporary use permit) for a charity fundraiser event at Le Mondrian Hotel. City Attorney Jenkins said he would advise bringing it back on March 18, for action by Council. Direction was given to process the T.U.P. application, to impose appropriate conditions, and to bring it back to Council if that is necessary.

8. ANIMAL CONTROL ORDINANCE: RECOMMENDATION: To introduce on first reading Ordinance No. _____, "AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF WEST HOLLYWOOD ADOPTING BY REFERENCE TITLE 10, ANIMALS, OF THE LOS ANGELES COUNTY CODE AND AMENDING THE WEST HOLLYWOOD MUNICIPAL CODE," and to set a date for a public hearing and instruct the City Clerk to advertise as a public hearing. City Attorney Jenkins made some minor changes to the proposed Ordinance.

The following persons came forward to address the City Council:
Jeanne Dobrin, W.H.: An ordinance that is needed. Objected to 10.36.330, regarding animals released.

There was discussion by Council and the City Attorney at this time.
Direction was given to the City Attorney to include in the Ordinance a specific prohibition against selling animals for research.
